A Year of Turmoil: Decisions



The writer Thomas Wolfe was probably right. It is difficult to go home again.

We spent much of November in sunny Florida contemplating the future and considering possible life scenarios.

It was a nice respite from high anxiety. The weather was mostly great, the seafood scrumptious, and seeing old friends from my various walks of life was

both warmly nostalgic and invigorating

I visited my oldest daughter and my 93-year-old mother, and held a successful reception for my new novel, "The Legacy of Moon Pie Jefferson". We talked to various high-flying PR agency executives in DC and Central Florida.

After three weeks, we reluctantly returned to gloomy skies over Ukraine, and to the danger of a full-scale war ever more present as the *Wizard of Odd* in the Kremlin moved more fire power into the violence-scarred east.

Today, an all out war is not something I would give odds against. In light of the current situation, we were forced to ask ourselves the question: Do we—as a family—really need this?

Do we need the 100 per cent devaluation of the currency since the last huge crisis of 2008? Do we need the specter of violent provocateurs prowling Kyiv's downtown? Do we need a business climate that is barely survivable and currently at dead calm?

In other words, after two decades abroad, there was serious thought given to "coming in from the cold"—tossing in the towel, calling it quits and heading to the Promise Land of

Apple, Disney World, humongous malls, heart-stopping breakfasts and yes, thank god, Obamacare.

Having launched businesses in the US, Ukraine, Russia and Turkey, how difficult would it be to start over —even at my age when most are touring Yellowstone Park in giant RV's, and playing 18-holes of golf thrice a week.

The feeling passed, though not in the wink of an eye. It was a week-long continuing discussion and awakening, perhaps aided by the sun finally coming out over Ukraine. Hell, I don't even play golf.

I have a young family which makes my retirement age closer to that of my mother's age, and the fact is, I didn't accidentally draw my circumstances. I picked them; and thus have enjoyed the road less traveled.

By definition, I signed up for a risky journey, though Ukraine is probably more dicey than I envisioned or bargained for 20 years ago. We have ridden the roller coaster of boom and bust. We have challenged the corrupt system and sometimes even won.

The fact is this: We live five minutes from Kyiv's Maidan, the epicenter of the revolution. We joined the protest on Day 1, and did what part we could for the revolution, as did countless others like us.

We invested in change, and in Ukraine. To abandon it now would be a comfortable challenge. But who needs comfort when history is being made, and you have an opportunity to have a small part in it.


